EIGHTH OBSERVANCE OF PENTECOSTAL BLESSINGS

The Congregation gathered for sunrise on the Temple Mount at Red Rock Consecrated Sanctuary on June 6th, a fixed date in the Sacred Calendar of the Second Advent Church for the observance of Second Advent Pentecost, forty-nine days after Second Advent Easter on April 18th. The sacred date of April 18th and the pentacontad cycle leading to June 6th are discussed in *The Book of God's Revelation*. Book II, entitled "The Seal of God's New Law," records the events, meditations, and visions experienced by The Man and The Companions of The Way on the day of Second Advent Pentecost, 1982.

The following excerpt from *The Book of God's Revelation* describes the vision experienced by The Man atop the Temple Mount of the Sanctuary of Prophecy on the day of Pentecost, 1982, and suggests the nature of the Revelations received that day:

And The Word of God spoke to his Soul a second time, revealing unto him the Sanctuary was under the special Blessing of God, and that he was to mark those sites where he communed with The Image and The Word.

And The Word of God proclaimed to The Man's Soul that the Righteous Ministry was ordained to go forth to the whole world, proclaiming God's Advent and the

freedom of the peoples from the tyranny of heretical governments.

And God did reveal to him a Proclamation of Human Spiritual Rights that all governments were to acknowledge and honor. The Righteous Ministers would be God's Envoys — as a nation in sanctuary — under the protection and sovereignty of God.

And The Word of God revealed that the Temple of uncut stones, made Righteous as was the sun of the earth, was blessed of God. And in the Temple, restored not by human hands but by the Hand of God, God would commune with the Righteous ordained to His Ministry.

And The Man saw a great cloud come over the Sanctuary and the face of the sun. And he felt God's Presence and Blessings over the Sanctuary. And he looked at the sun grown brilliant by the clouds, its rays burning as fire, and he heard the Word of God say, "Let none but the Righteous in The Way look upon The Image I have made for a blessing over the land."

This day a gift is bestowed upon the Church of My Second Advent. The Light of the Sun in the Eight Appearances shall make wise the Souls of the Righteous who will have understanding and knowledge of God. United they shall be by spirit, bonded together as One in God, and there shall be no diversity amongst them.

"The Spirit of God is poured down upon His People who hear God's Word. Let the Righteous seek out the Temple and be anointed by God for an earthly mission to make Righteous the people of the world."

And from out of the cloud the Man saw a Heavenly City formed by shafts of light

Series of Lectures Delivered in Chapel *Liturgical Training Begins for Clergy Students*

Beginning in May resident clergy and clergy students received the first nine of a series of twenty-four lectures which constitute an introduction to liturgical training. These lectures described the genesis of the religions of antiquity, with commentary on scientific and philosophical treatments of the subject matter brought under discussion.

This series of evening lectures, delivered by The Most Right Reverend Gene Savoy from the pulpit of the University Chapel, was designed to add to the cleric's knowledge of religion in the popular or orthodox form as well as the more esoteric or mystical forms. The series is preparatory to the high level of

liturgical involvement for which clerics have been trained.

During Bishop Savoy's summer-long expedition to Peru these first lectures were compiled in transcript form and mailed to The Church's clerical students throughout North America, Europe and Oceania.

Following the delivery of the entire introductory lecture series, cassette recordings of the lectures will be mailed to participants.

The transcripts and tapes are to be supplemented by pre-publication text papers on the *Golden Book of God's Prophecies and Revelations: The Secret Sayings of Jamil*, along with other study materials. ♦

descending from the sun. And he saw that City hovering over the Sanctuary and the Temple Mount. And the City of Heaven and the Temple of the Sanctuary, with its mounts, were united by those shafts of light. And the shafts of light shone like blue pillars of sapphire reaching upward into the sun.

After a time the invisible City that had appeared returned to Heaven, but the light remained on the seven mounts in the likeness of thrones. And The Man heard The Word speaking to his Soul saying, "The Heavenly City of Light made visible by God shall be hidden to all but the Companions of The Way, anointed."

And after the City had risen, he felt the presence of The Light. He saw the sun's response to the Divine Presence as great flares of light emitted from its surface.

And again The Word spoke saying, "As the Seven Mounts of the Temple have

been sanctified by The Presence and bound to Heaven by cords of light beams, consecrate the Mounts of the Temple with holy oils for anointings of the Righteous. Let the faithful ordained to the Ministry of Righteousness be bound to these rocks and to the sun by the anointings, as the Soul and the Spirit are united with God by The Image and The Word in Light.

"God would that earthly Temples be such as this Temple — formed of stone uncut by human hands and joined with God by cords of Light — for the City of God's Presence will descend upon gathering places such as these here.

"The True Temple of God is the Light of His Image and Word, and the True Temple of man is the Soul wherein dwells The Image and The Word.

"In the final age of the earth, at the threshold of the consummation by Fire,

man, as flesh not made in The Image of God, has need of gathering places where the Light is quickened for the good of the Soul. For The Word has revealed that God shall indeed send a Divine redeeming Fire to enlighten Souls and burn up that wickedness first loosed by Satan and the fallen Angels of Darkness, lest the heretical nations ruin the world and the races.

"It is good that humankind restore order on earth in Justice, Love, Peace, Wisdom, and Understanding, thereby limiting the power of evil and of man. The Temple of uncut stones is given for a blessing and for the guidance of the nations and their peoples."

On that same day, June 6, 1982, The Man marked the lesser mounts of the Temple Mount, the Garden of Oracles, and the site to be called "God's Waters." ♦

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Parochial School Honors Class of '89

Diplomas Conferred on First Graduates

The first graduating class of The Jamilian Parochial School was honored at a commencement ceremony held Friday, May 26th in the vestibule of the University Chapel at the Apostolic Chancellery. Over fifty Community members and friends of the graduating students were in attendance.

Following introduction of the Most Right Rev. Gene Savoy, Head Bishop of the Second Advent Church and founder of the Parochial School, and the members of the School Council Board: The Reverends Carol Salverson, Ileana Isfan, and Sylvia Savoy, chairman, members of the gathering joined in singing the National Anthem under the direction of school choir mistress Jacklynn Lord. Bishop Savoy delivered the Invocation.

As president of the Student Representative Council (SRC) of the School, Gene Savoy, Jr. presented "Teacher of the Year" awards to the teachers that Student Council members selected as most outstanding for each semester: for the first semester, Right Reverend

Sylvia Savoy for outstanding performance as instructor in Spanish; for the second semester, Reverend Gary Buchanan for outstanding performance as instructor in Geometry.

The final presentation was a deed of gift from the Student Council to the School, the School's first flag, designed by Christopher Sean Savoy, vice-president of the SRC.

Following the presentations, 1989 class salutatorian Gene Savoy, Jr. delivered his address, in which he emphasized the "new era" approaching:

"Those who wish to benefit from the new progress and the higher civilization which is being built and established today in this community of ours must be determined to lead and to teach. The student of the School must recognize the value of morality, for moral enlightenment is the foundation of law and order..."

"The youths of our School must have a higher conception of life than the average student. The school is the place to learn how to learn. The

school is the place where children are taught to be self-reliant. Students can develop, with proper guidance, the ability to perform wherever and whenever needed. While always searching for knowledge and truth with self-confidence and vigor, they must learn to manage their thoughts and master the art of observation...

"Together we shall continue to work. Together we shall instruct the younger people of our Community. And together we shall continue to grow."

1989 Class Valedictorian Christopher Sean Savoy addressed the gathering on the advantages of a good education:

"The time spent at the Jamilian Parochial School, from which my classmates and I are graduating, has been one of the first of our educational experiences... It has been filled not only with academic achievements but with friendship. We have learned not only from books but from each other. We have matured, learned, and made decisions together, and our friendship, I hope, will be everlasting.

"Yet our friendship is not limited to our peers; it extends further. We have a special friendship with the dedicated people who have taught us — the people who have cared. These are the people who have given us confidence to undertake the challenges of the future, and for this we are forever grateful.

"But now it is up to us. We must go beyond the limited boundaries of this learning experience, for we are of the age now when we must take responsibility for our actions and for our thoughts. We must be responsible citizens, responsible adults, and maybe one day responsible parents...now that we must choose the role that we will play in the world, we must choose it well, for we are tomorrow..."

Guest speaker The Most Right Reverend Gene Savoy addressed the Class of 1989 with excerpts taken from the classical tome, *Travels With Cyrus*, which speaks of the Persian

monarch's inquiries and observations of Spartan education.

As the main event of the evening, the Administrator and Master of Ceremonies Rev. Robert Petrovich presented the class of 1989: Bradley Derek Buchanan; Student Representative Council Treasurer Erica Jalayne Grady; Student Representative Council Vice-President, Spanish Honor Student, and Class Valedictorian Christopher Sean Savoy; Student Representative Council President, History Honors Student, and Class Salutatorian Douglas Eugene Savoy, Jr.

As the students walked up to the dais, they greeted Bishop Savoy, received diplomas from Rev. Sylvia Savoy, received a red rose from Rev. Ileana Isfan, received Honors Diplomas from Rev. Carol Salverson, and shook hands with Rev. Robert Petrovich.

At the conclusion of the program, under the direction of Choir Mistress Jacklynn Lord, the students of the Jamilian Parochial School sang the School's Alma Mater, written especially for this first Commencement Ceremony, lyrics by Sean Savoy and music by Church Composer and School Music Director, The Reverend Gary Robert Buchanan (see inset this page)

Exploration and Research as a Benefit to The Church

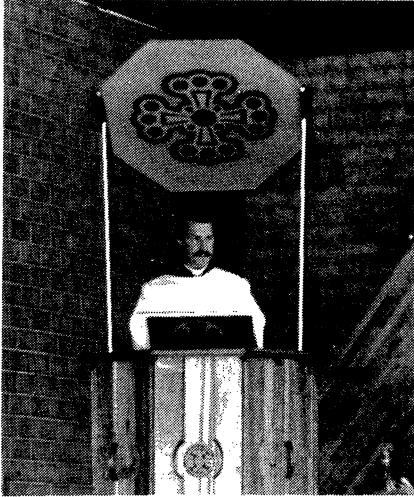

The sermon chosen for public report this summer season was concerned with the upcoming expedition to Peru. Bishop Savoy, President of the Andean Explorers Foundation and Ocean Sailing Club, delivered this sermon before the resident Congregation in the University Chapel at the Apostolic Chancellery. The sermon has been edited and abridged for publication.

June 3, 1989

Three days before leaving on expedition to Peru, Bishop Savoy addressed the Congregation on the expansion of The Church to be undertaken in the near future and the part the upcoming Grand Vilaya IV expedition will play in this future. He pointed to the development of new departments in the Church, the Liturgical program, building projects, and the functions of the Andean Explorers Foundation.

In preparation for the expedition a video department under the direction of The Reverend Roger Weld was created to record the expected findings of the expedition and to provide documentary material for upcoming films and videotapes for both private and public showings. In the future,

he said, video tapes as well as printed materials would be used "for teaching and demonstrating Liturgics" and to provide "aids to residence training and oral techniques."

The continuance and expansion of the Liturgical program, he said, "will allow the emergence of the Jamilian Order as a purely religious society for vowed monastics and teachers." He added that lay and secular chaplains, as well as ministers of Second Advent rites, will be trained in the program.

The building of the Consolatory and Church of Human Spiritual Rights will allow The Church to broaden our services to include people from other churches, he said. The completion of the building expected this fall would allow The Church to inaugurate the Human Spiritual Rights seminar as an annual event "which we hope will reach out to people world-wide."

"The Explorers Foundation will begin to function in a more dramatic

fashion," he said. These functions will include the building of the Feathered Serpent III and the Heritage Museum, as well as the underwriting of further expeditions. Seminars in foreign lands will be undertaken, he said, for the purpose of making video tapes that will allow both resident and non-resident Church and Foundation members to participate on site or by video. He said Egypt, Israel, Greece, Mexico, the Pacific Islands and other areas are to be visited in these future expeditions.

In a final note Bishop Savoy expressed the conviction that the Peruvian expedition to be undertaken shortly will benefit The Church's public image, allow for more involvement by all Consociates of The Church, and lay a foundation for the creation of new facilities to produce new educational materials, including books, film and video documentaries, sound recordings, and expanded media capabilities. ♦

Jamilian Parochial School Events

Prom Ball and Recognition Day Ceremonies

On Friday, May 19th a formal Prom Ball was held at 8:00 P.M. at the Rectory-Abbey on La Fond Drive, in honor of the Jamilian Parochial School's first graduating class. The Class of 1989 invited youths 10 years of age and older as well as parents and ministers of The Church to join in the festivities.

As a prelude to the dance, the four graduates and their dates dined at the Steak House at Bally's Grand Hotel.

The Formal, sponsored by the newly formed Student Representative Council of the JPS, was the first dance of its kind in the history of the School.

On June 24th, at the annual Recognition Day Ceremonies, the Jamilian

Parochial School honored the outstanding accomplishments of the student body during the 1988-89 school year. Following opening performances of the school band, conducted by Bruce Kanzelmeyer, refreshments were served while The Reverend Ileana Isfan hosted a guided tour of the school commenting upon the student artwork on display throughout the building. After an opening address to parents, teachers, and students by the School Administrator Rev. Robert Petrovich, the faculty presented certificates to their students in recognition of academic merit and achievement. The program closed with additional musical selections performed by students. ♦

PROJECT X Research Team, Expedition Party in Peru

Film and Video Documentary in Progress

The first Research-Study Seminar co-sponsored by the Jamilian University, the Project X Program, and the Andean Explorers Foundation and Ocean Sailing Club was held June 5-14 on location in Peru. In April, Jamilian University Consociates and members of the Explorers Foundation were invited to attend this pre-expedition study seminar. The University's first field research initiative open to those not actually in the study program.

During the study tour members of the expedition were filmed and interviewed, actually becoming part of the film documentary. As film director, Gene Savoy conducted the tours, providing a unique opportunity to broaden the participants' knowledge and understanding of the University's research.

Prior to the actual tour, Gene Savoy outlined in a lecture to Project X students the purposes of the trip, which are three-fold: (1) to share research on site with participating members of the program, (2) to record a series of video tapes for private use by our members, (3) to begin the motion picture planned for many years dealing with Mr. Savoy's findings on ancient cultures. The resulting film will document for the first time his discoveries on ancient sciences and mystical religions.

Thirty individuals from the United States, Canada, and South Africa took part in the field seminar. The majority of the participants departed from Los Angeles to Lima, Peru on Monday, June 5th, where they met late that evening with other seminar members at the Crillon Hotel, Lima.

The next afternoon the group received a guided tour of the city of Lima, founded in 1535 by Francisco Pizarro and now the fifth largest city in South America with a population of six million. The group visited both colonial Lima and the modern suburbs, the Lima Cathedral, the Plaza de Armas, the Government Palace,

the Torre Tagle Palace, the Olive Grove in Necocha Park, and the Archaeological Museum of Lima. The Casa Aliaga, the oldest private household in the Western Hemisphere, newly opened to tourists, was also on the tour schedule, as was a visit to an outdoor art gallery in the beautiful Miraflores district.

The seminar group left Lima on Thursday, June 8, to take a leisurely drive along the coast to the desert plains of Nazca. The next day Project X members flew over the famous Nazca lines, filmed for the Foundation by cameraman Roger Weld from the open hatchway of a single-engine three-seater airplane.

Back in Lima on June 10th, the group took a short airplane trip to Cuzco, ancient capitol of the Incas, a city hidden in an inaccessible valley high in the Andes mountains where the Empire flourished for five hundred years only to eventually expire under the sword of the Spanish. The visit to the fortresses of Pucara, Sacsayhuaman and Tampumachay provided Foundation soundman Gary Buchanan opportunity to

record local natives performing music from before the Conquest on panpipes, or "sicus," as they echoed off the megalithic walls in reverberant canons. The Inca amphitheatres and the Temple of the Sun in central Cuzco provided the troupe with an afternoon of further discovery.

An excursion to the hidden mountain refuge of Machu Picchu began Sunday morning with a train ride through the sacred Urubamba Valley to the ancient sanctuary of the Inca, known to them as "Tampu Tocco." Undiscovered until 1911 by Hiram Bingham, this magnificent mountain fortress boasts the Rounded House of the Sun; the famous "Intihuatana" stone, or "hitching post of the sun"; a watch tower; the wall of "Three Windows"; remains of temples, houses, baths and workshops; the Coricancha, which was the "Golden Enclosure"; the "Accla-Huasi," or "Chosen Women's House"; and a mile-long open aqueduct — all surrounded by majestic terracing and views of indescribable scenic beauty. The study group spent the night at the Hotel Turista, located amidst the

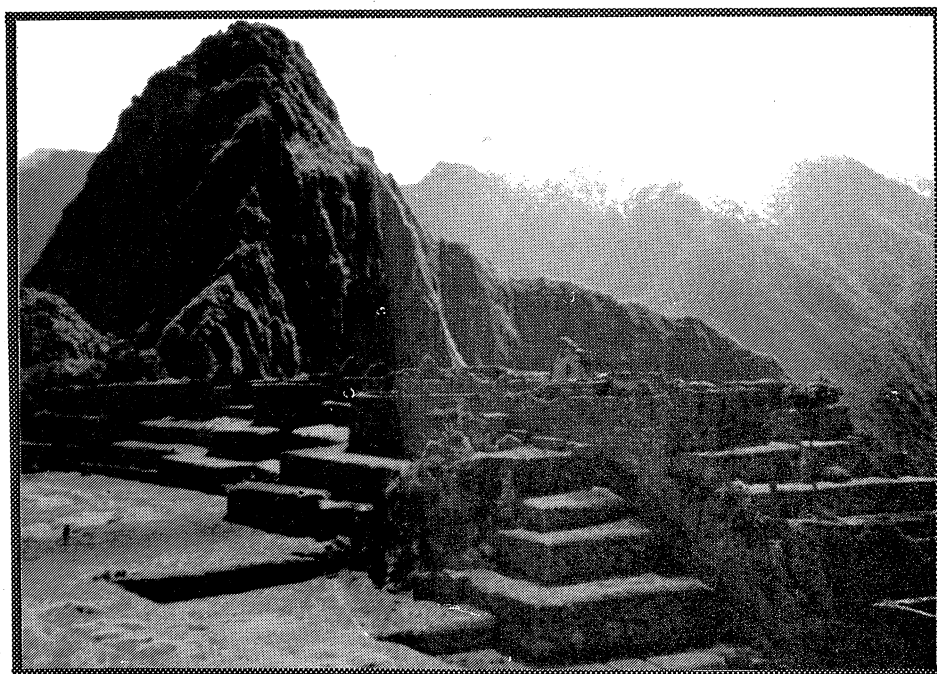

ruins. The magnificent sunrise over Intihuatani the next morning was captured on film, as was the series of daily lectures delivered on site by Savoy.

On Monday the group continued the exploration of the ruins at Machu Picchu and returned by train to Cuzco Tuesday afternoon, June 13th, through the Sacred Valley of the Incas. After a short flight back to Lima that evening, Mr. Savoy delivered a concluding lecture at the Hotel Crillon. The following night, the study group departed Lima and returned to the United States late in the afternoon of June 15th.

Following the research-study film trip, the camera crew and expedition members remained in Peru to cross the Andes, where they intend to film the University's recent discoveries several hundred miles north of Lima in the Department of Amazonas, territory of the legendary Chachapoyas civilization, where the Foundation's 1985 expedition, under the direction of Gene Savoy, reclaimed from the high jungles the vast metropolis of Gran Vilaya. Subsequent expeditions

have proven this find, measuring some one hundred square miles and containing over twenty thousand individual structures, to be the largest pre-Columbian site in the Americas.

The 1989 expedition is expected to broaden the scope of the Foundation's original findings on the Chachapoyas, the mysterious white race that inhabited the area. According to local tradition, these people were taught by the enigmatic figure Viracocha, who was identified as St. Thomas by the early Spanish chroniclers investigating the religious and cultural beliefs of the natives.

The duration of the entire Project X research-study program is planned to extend over the next seven years, during which time Mr. Savoy intends to publish seven books of comparative religious studies centering on ancient solar cultures and their common origins. Other places to be visited include Mexico, Israel, Greece, Egypt, India, China, Easter Island, Indonesia, the Hawaiian Islands, Italy, Spain, and parts of Africa. ♦

Steamboat Work Projects Continue

Work on the new parsonage at Steamboat Villa continued through June. During the early spring months, weekend volunteer work crews laid a roof of red Spanish tile on the structure they had raised the previous fall. Interior structural repairs and finishing work on the parsonage dwelling quarters also have been completed. The crew is presently constructing the office space on the first floor of the parsonage building. ♦

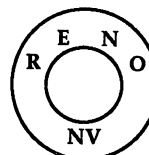
