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Bishop Savoy delivers annual State of the Church address *Jamilian Order and primary function of Church discussed*

The Most Right Reverend Gene Savoy delivered his State of The Church address from the pulpit in a two-part sermon, on December 6 and December 20.

The annual address traditionally precedes the Christmas-Epiphany Season.

The December 6 sermon announced to the Congregation gathered in the Memorial Chapel of the Holy Child the formal commencement of the Jamilian Order prophesied in *The Sayings of Jamil*. Bishop Savoy discussed in this sermon the liturgical life those men and women appointed to the Order will lead as that sacred body takes shape.

He also made reference to the requirements the Second Advent Church must meet before the Order could be generally activated.

The Bishop described the second part of the address, yet to come, as "instructive in nature" and "more of an exhortation."

The concluding portion of the Bishop's address, given the following Saturday, December 20, noted that the mainline churches of established Christianity, numbering 1200-1500 organizations, are recognized by their larger membership and for their influence upon the mass media.

"Their imposing church buildings and influential ministries are accepted in modern society for what they are: large organizations that take their place in the status quo," said the Bishop.

He pointed out that the "presence" of their primary organizations, concerned chiefly with their own particular theological views, "is amplified by their secondary and tertiary organizations."

According to Bishop Savoy, these secondary organizations serve the primary bodies by performing missionary work, educating seminarians, publishing religious materials, and caring for orphans and the aged. The tertiary organizations strive to change the primary religious bodies by the "promotion of one social issue." He gave the examples of ecumenical or-

ganizations which "seek the unity of churches" and others which seek to promote world peace.

The Bishop continued his analysis by classifying the three features that dominate the families of religious bodies. First, the heritage of a religious body sets it apart from other churches. Second, the

Church holds six-day general Convocation *Enlightening lecture on pre-Ordained given*

A general Convocation was held in Reno, September 22-28. Twenty guests from the United States and Canada joined members of the Second Advent Clergy and ministers-in-training during the six days of scheduled lectures given at the University Building and at the Sacred Oversee.

The agenda also included liturgical services of Communion of Fellowship, sunrise Divine Worship, and Lamentation Prayer held at The Memorial Chapel of The Holy Child in Reno, the Sanctuary of Prophecy at Red Rock, and at New Mount Zion, respectively. Other events were a first-degree ordination, an informal tea at the Rectory-Abbey, and a farewell dinner at the Bishop's residence.

The Most Right Reverend Gene Savoy, Head Bishop of The Church, met with non-resident first-year students — all day, Monday and Tuesday, September 22-23 — to give them oral teachings required for the first-year residence training. This group of Consociates received their first-

degree ordination the next day in private ceremony in the Bishop's Chambers at the Apostolic Chancellery.

Second-year students also completed their residence training program during the first three days of seminar activities. Appointed clergymen and women tutored them from early morning until evening, Monday through Wednesday at the Chancellery Complex. On the third day, Bishop Savoy met with the group at the Sacred Oversee to impart liturgical techniques personally in the oral tradition.

Those visiting Consociates who began Clergy studies through the Extension Program of the Jamilian University and who were not able to attend the summer Convocation were given the opportunity to review the matters discussed and lectured upon at that time. They were invited to attend special sessions so they could listen to recordings of the proceedings of the earlier Convocation under the guidance of

Work crews begin three major projects at Church sanctuaries

Massive fencing project completed by Guild and volunteers

On October 23, the Building Department of The Church, together with members of the Building Guild and volunteer men and women of The Church, completed the fencing project started last May 22 at the Sanctuary of Prophecy.

Crews operating under the direction of Reverend Nelson Duchesneau dug post holes, set them in concrete, and welded cable hooks onto the fence posts.

Volunteer men, women, and children painted an average of 100-150 posts each weekend. Following the painters came others who strung nearly 3,000 feet of cable.

Upon completion of the fencing project at the Red Rock Sanctuary, a similar project was begun at New Mount Zion during

early November. Lamentation Services, regularly held at this site Sundays at noon, were suspended until erection of the fence is completed.

On October 24, the day after the fence at the Sanctuary of Prophecy was completed, water was reached by the well-digging crew atop the Sanctuary's Temple Mount.

The well, at the site of the proposed Shrine of God's Waters, was started September 17. One month later, after digging down 1270 feet through hard granite, the crew hit an underground stream yielding 25-30 gallons of water per minute. The next day the crew drilled down to the 1320 foot level, the well's final depth, thus increasing the water flow to 50-60 gallons per minute. The well remains capped until the Shrine is developed.

A second well was drilled on the south Sanctuary near the north gate, just west

of Castle Peak Road. Work on the well, drilled on the low flatlands, was begun on November 14 and completed on December 10. The water source was hit at a depth of 320 feet.

These are the second and third wells to be drilled on Sanctuary grounds. The first one was drilled in 1984 near the present charterhouse, at the base of the hill upon which the Abbey of Monte Viejo will be constructed.

Ground was broken for the Abbey, proposed administrative center of the Sanctuary, on December 3. The construction site was consecrated with holy water and oil on that day by Bishop Savoy.

Future expansion of the Sanctuary includes building the Shrine of God's Waters, the Singing Tower of Rainbows, the placement of the Tablary of the Sanctuary, and the marking of the Pillars to the Temple Mount. ♦

sacraments, and ecclesiology. Third, lifestyles vary according to the family's view of the world around them.

He then proceeded by analogy to describe these features as they appear in the Second Advent Church. His discussion covered Doctrine, Revelation, Creeds, Sacrament, Liturgy, Church authority, heritage, the School of Great Learning, the Order, and the New Condition of the world under the Messianic Sun of Righteousness.

"It is essential in our new Church as a religious institution to build the primary body first; that is, the building blocks of a Second Advent Ministry. This begins with individuals who are trained as ministers and as religious workers," he said.

He continued by saying that though The Church is presently at work building public chapels and Sanctuary churches, establishing the Abodes and the Shrine of God's Waters, and educating the ministry through the Schools, none should lose sight of The Church's main purpose for existing. "This is a living institution of God's Will. The Second Advent Church is

more than the incorporated institution under Nevada law. The unincorporated Church is a spiritual entity instituted by God and nurtured by God's Divine Presence under Sacred Law," he emphasized.

The Bishop went on to explain that the spiritual Church governs the actions of spirit and soul. The temporal Church is chiefly concerned with the actions of men and women "in the world under civil authority" and "through the self-expression and presence of its members."

The primary function of the Second Advent Church is spiritual instruction and the performance of the Sacred and Holy Rites. These rites are "divine formulae given of God through Revelation."

The Bishop described those rites as a "closed program of private study, heritage, and lifestyle unique to the Essaei, the Therapeutae, and afterwards the 'edah-Church under Jesus." He added, "Our ministry re-establishes or restores the Sacred Rites practiced by Jesus and his disciples."

The homily further emphasized that

tutors appointed by Bishop Gene Savoy.

A two-part lecture entitled "The Pre-Ordained of God's Second Coming in the Advent of the Sun of Righteousness" was delivered by Bishop Savoy on the afternoons of the 25th and 26th. The lecture, part of the Counsel Series, was delivered at the University Building to the entire body of students and clergy.

Bishop Savoy's exposition continued the theme of the lecture he delivered earlier this year at the Sixth Counsels Meeting. In that lecture Bishop Savoy gave additional information on the history of the pre-ordained of ancient days, their teachings, and their opponents.

In his new lecture Bishop Savoy explained the situation and requirements of the pre-ordained in the present day as compared to the conditions of ancient times.

He pointed out that the physical sun is the world's point of emergence from a pre-existent universe and, for us, "a portal to another universe" accessible only to our spiritual faculties.

The Bishop stated that the natural order of the world was a "degenerate replica of a primordial, supernatural order."

He related the fate of primordial man, who lived in a different environment closer to the pre-existent order, as well as the fate of his present-day descendants; how descendants of primordial man become protagonists and antagonists of the Teachings in every age, noting Jesus' failure to marshal an Order and form a True Spiritual Nation in Israel in the midst of strong opposition. "The masses [during Jesus' time] were unable to help. They were mere spectators. When it was over, when the Essaei were put down, they just went about their mundane ways," he said.

This theme led on to a discourse on the type of individual who seeks after The Teacher who heads the resurgence in a great period of religious revelation. Bishop Savoy said that this response is out of instinct and that, usually, those who respond are the Sons and Daughters of Heaven who go on to make the religion a reality. "So it is in the Second Advent," he added. He remarked that each person must make a choice of either mortal or

spiritual endeavor, adding that Teachers of old chose out only the spiritual few, the pre-ordained, while The Church's Teachings are for everyone without prejudice in this final age.

The Bishop went on to say that material man avoids thinking about the final confrontation and conflagration Scripture tells us to expect because he wants to avoid facing the prospect of 'no earth to stand on,' and for this reason, it seems natural that the pre-ordained would respond first, with more understanding than ordinary mortals.

"We need to build a Community that will allow Spirit to incarnate in people," stressed the Bishop. He stated that such a

Community would be especially for the pre-ordained but also "for all people everywhere."

He tempered this statement with a note of caution. "The Community is for everyone," he said, "but we must not forget our enemies who use the arm of the state to fight us."

The final hours of the two-day lecture concerned the conflict of the men of Light and the men of Darkness in the ancient of days up through the conflict of the Messianic Churches and the Roman Church in the first centuries A.D.

Bishop Savoy concluded the lecture series with a warning on the fading of

The charterhouse south of the Abbey site was also blessed and consecrated later that afternoon. ♦

the "new Church" is not seeking to change the older Churches; it is separate from them. "What we strive to do," said the Bishop, "is to educate those who come from the older Churches to our School of Great Learning." He identified these as people who wish to study and apply Second Advent doctrines, not as a matter of faith or belief but as "a religious life-science that brings about a rebirth of spirit."

The Bishop said it can be clearly seen that "our Church is so different from Catholic or Protestant churches that we must stand alone as the Second Advent Church."

He remarked that "the established Churches have, to some degree, lost sight of their heritage."

"Of great importance," added Bishop Savoy, "is the fact that Revelations are an

ongoing occurrence within the structure of our Church. This demonstrates a living Communion with God."

The Bishop later enjoined the ministers assembled to reflect upon their duties, especially with the approaching "significant days of our Sacred Calendar."

"The things of God should influence our status in the world. The world should not influence our status as ministers," he stressed.

In conclusion, Bishop Savoy reminded the assembly of congregants that the Second Advent Church is not a man-made institution but rather an institution of God. "We each assume our place in His Holy Church as co-workers ordained to His service. Remember that God gives life. The world brings death to us all. To deny this fact is for fools, not the wise," the Bishop said. ♦

ethics and morals in a materialistic society such as our own where humanistic needs override spiritual and aesthetic needs, emphasizing the greater need for higher ethics and morality now than was necessary before.

"The Church is concerned with personal dignity, Communion with God, and religious freedom. The Second Advent Church offers beauty and dignity to each age group. Our hope is in Community, not individually, in the Sun," he said.

The next day, Saturday, September 27, non-resident students joined the Reno clergy, students and general congregation in a Communion of Fellowship service at The Memorial Chapel of the Holy Child.

A second service of Communion was held Sunday before sunrise at the Church of Second Advent Epiphany in the Sanctuary of Prophecy. Divine Service followed.

Later, in Reno, guests, students, the ordained, and their families attended a mid-morning tea at the Rectory-Abbey before proceeding to New Mount Zion for Service of Lamentation and Prayer at noon.

A musical performance was staged for guests, Reno residents, and their families Sunday evening at The Memorial Chapel. The one-hour concert, conducted by Gary

R. Buchanan, Music Director of The Church, featured new works. The performance of the Sinfonietta, the Church's musical ensemble, was punctuated by explanatory comments delivered by Mr.

Buchanan, composer of the musical selection.

The Convocation ended later in the evening at the Rectory-Abbey with the traditional farewell dinner. ♦

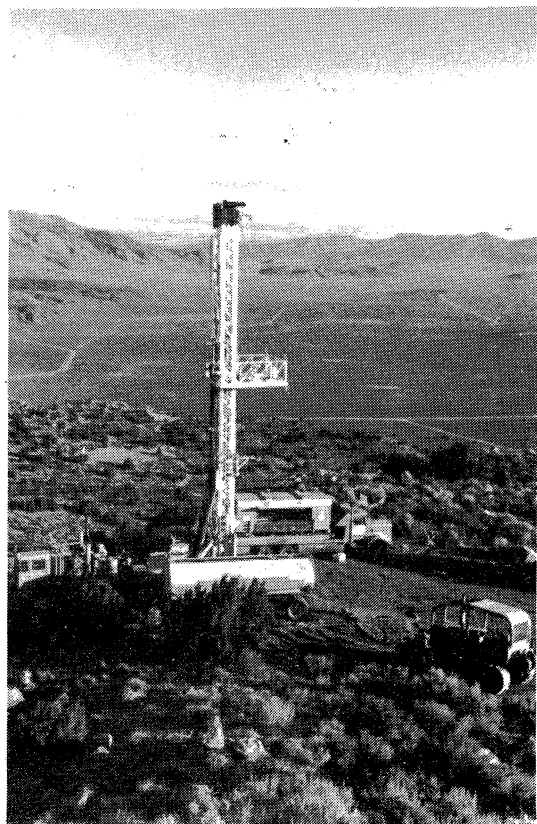

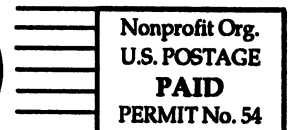
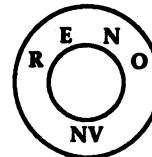
