Dr. Clair Earl (1933 - 2011)



Clair Frehner Earl was born one of five children in the small farming community of Overton, Nevada, to Milton and Erma Earl. He attended the University of Nevada-Reno from 1951-1955. Upon completion of four years of ROTC, he was commissioned as a 2nd Lieutenant in the U.S. Army Artillery. Clair studied at Brigham Young University where he met Mildred Meyer. They were married for "time and eternity" in the Logan Utah Temple of the LDS Church.

Clair was employed as a chemist for Titanium Metals and Bureau of Mines in Southern Nevada. He became a 1st Lieutenant in the U.S. Army and later served in the Army Reserves. In 1963, he graduated from the University of Oregon Dental School. As a dentist for 47 years in Reno, he was an active

member and leader in the Nevada Dental Society, and served as president.

Seeking to make a difference in his community, he envisioned bringing people of various faiths together to solve problems, build relationships, and serve those in need. Some of his contributions included service on the Community Welfare Board, Family Promise of Reno/Sparks, the Washoe County Interfaith Clergy Association, and the Interfaith Council. Since its inception, Clair and Mildred have been strong supporters of the annual Interfaith Thanksgiving Eve Service.

Clair was known for his charity, his kindness, and his interest in people. His smile, handshake and "Tell me how you are!" were his trademarks. Devoted to God and dedicated to his faith, Clair served his entire life within the LDS Church, including assignments as teacher, Young Men's president, bishop, and 27 years in multi-congregational leadership as counselor in two Stake presidencies and as a Stake president. He was a leader in the Scouts of America for over 40 years. All of his sons were Eagle Scouts.

Amidst all their other commitments, Clair and Mildred prioritized family. They are the parents of 11 children and grandparents to 54 grandchildren and one great-grandchild. In March 2011, Clair and Mildred celebrated 55 years of marriage.

Rabbi Myra Soifer



Myra Soifer was ordained a rabbi at the Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion (the rabbinic seminary of Reform Judaism) in Cincinnati in 1978, becoming one of the first 10 women rabbis in the world. Her first rabbinic position was as the Assistant Rabbi at Temple Sinai in New Orleans. In 1984, she came to Reno to be the rabbi of Temple Sinai. She served in that position for 25 years, retiring in July 2009 when she was named the synagogue's Rabbi Emerita. In September of 2012, Myra was called back to Temple Sinai to guide it through rabbinic transition. She will be retiring a second time (!) this coming June. She is also a per-diem Spiritual Care Counselor with Circle of Life Hospice.

Myra was born in Miami and grew up in a far-south suburb of Chicago. She graduated from Lawrence University in Appleton, Wisconsin, with a B.A. in 1973. In addition to her M.A. in Hebrew Letters (HUC 1977) and her 1978 ordination, she was awarded a Doctor of Divinity, honoris causis, from the seminary in 2003.

Myra's rabbinate has always included a heavy focus on social justice, with commitment to a host of causes including reproductive freedom, abolishing the death penalty, gay rights, and championing all manner of diversity. In the 1980s, she was involved in peace and justice work in Central America, serving as the National Chair of Witness For Peace. Interfaith work has been a central joy and blessing in her career. In 1991, she organized a local group of colleagues, known as the "Study Buddies," that met monthly for nearly two decades. She is the convener of a local clergywomen's group, and she can be seen at most local interfaith events. She is proud that, as a member of the Interfaith Hospitality Network, Temple Sinai was the only Jewish congregation in the country to work together with the Muslim community to help families in need. Outside of her ministerial passions, Myra loves ballroom dancing and traveling. She also loves her legal ward, 20-year-old Adam Fliess. She rejoices in a life that has been mightily blessed and is very, very good.
